National Arboretum Canberra

A little while ago, I made the pilgrimage to the National Arboretum, as a Friend of the Arboretum I felt it was time to become acquainted with the site while it was still in its youth.

What a treasure the 250 hectare plot of bushfire ravished land is turning out to be. This is a wonderful example of a blessing in disguise. The devastating fires in Canberra in 2003 took out thousands of hectares of farming land and pine forests and have forced us to use our ingenuity and creativity.



Of course Walter Burley Griffin, Canberra's architect, in his original drawings had included an arboretum in this space but too many other things prioritised the evolution of Canberra and it was left out until now. In its juvenile state, the arboretum is already splendid. Enormous amounts or soil have been moved around the site, creating soft rolling hills framing expansive valleys and enhanced by terracing which has the effect of wind on sand. There is a westerly aspect to the site but most of the fall is to the east. The views are sensational, with area s at the top of the site having 360 degree views. The eastern views sweep across the valley taking in the Zoo, Lake Burley Griffin, Woden, Civic, Black Mountain and out as far as the airport. As the forests mature, views will be less obvious but trees will frame and provide long vistas to the focal points beyond. This is a prime piece of real estate and is been used to its absolute optimum. I can't wait to watch it grow.

Of the 100 forests to be planted, 65 are now in, that's about 29,000 trees and counting. Each forest contains rare, threatened and symbolic tree species from around the world. Collection of trees and seeds has been a fascinating exercise on its own, with many trees no longer growing in the wild and seed collection proving to be interesting to say the least. With the ideal seed collection coming from a minimum of 30 trees, many of these rare specimens don't have stands that big in nature. There are plantations of certain species of trees bigger in the arboretum than anywhere else in the world.


Within each forest, the trees have been planted to form different patterns and shapes. The Bunya Pine forest is planted in the shape of a heart and some

of the trees were planted by Glenn McGrath and his family in honour of his wife Jane the founding member of Jane McGrath Foundation. The tree guards on site are all pink and a percentage of the profit of these goes to the McGrath Foundation.

Originally, electric fences were constructed around the forests, but the local fauna had not received that memo and the fences proved useless. With further experimentation, it was discovered that tree guards taller than the average roo were viewed as a threat and treated with contempt by kangaroos, so they too had to be re-assessed.

It was mentioned that in time, giraffes' may be encouraged through the underpass from the zoo, to graze in various areas of the arboretum, that is my idea of biodiversity and what a lovely site from the GDE when you are driving past.

There is still so much to do and many areas of construction including the visitors centre, the reflection pavilion a water wise garden and the new home for the national bonsai and penjing collection of Australia. But even in is juvenile state, it is easy to see that the arboretum is going to be a National Treasure.

Riverview Fresh Hazelnuts

As seen on "Mecurio's Menu"

Each February Les and Robyn Beresford invite members of the public to pick their hazelnuts at "Riverview". Their hazelnut farm was established some 14 years ago in the grasslands on the banks of the Murrumbidgee River at 1173 Wallaroo Road, Hall. The hazelnuts were planted on gentle slopes and follow the contour lines, and there are over a dozen varieties of hazelnuts in their orchard of 1000 trees

The "Riverview" hazelnuts are unique in that they are grown as bushes rather than trees. Hazelnuts are a bush in their natural state. This makes the "Riverview" hazelnut orchard easier to pick from as well as being ideal for a "pick your own" family experience.

Once again February and the "Pick your Own" hazelnut season is fast approaching and Les and Robyn invite you and your family to visit their farm and pick your own hazelnuts. Hazelnuts can be eaten when freshly picked from the bush (after cracking them from the shell), and eaten raw, dried or roasted to intensify their flavor. Most of us know hazelnuts from "in the shell" or wrapped in chocolate. Freshly picked hazelnuts are great in salads, eaten raw with grapes and cheese as a snack, or sprinkled over desserts. Paul Mecurio made an apple hazelnut tart, braised them with prawns and tossed them in a salad. They can even be used in soups, biscuits, cakes etc --- their uses are as flexible as you can be creative.

Health wise, hazelnuts are higher in Vitamin E and have more monounsaturated fats than other nuts. They are also an excellent food for maintenance of healthy blood and development of muscle cells due to their generous supply of nutrients - iron, copper and manganese. Hazelnuts also supply ample amounts of calcium and potassium.

When you visit "Riverview", Les and Robyn will give you information on how to care for your "Riverview Fresh Hazelnuts" – unlike other fresh food products, when correctly cared for, hazelnuts will last indefinitely in their shell. Les and Robyn have had delicious hazelnuts from their orchard more than two years after they were picked from their bushes.



Dung Beetle field day at Minto

Chris & Greg Stuart, of Minto Galloways, recently held a dung beetle field day at their Hall property. John Feehan, OAM, formerly from CSIRO, where Chris worked for many years, presented the talk to an audience of local people and Galloways Australia members.

John emphasized that dung beetles were a natural way to return dung to the soil, with all the benefits that come from removing surface dung – particularly removing the breeding ground of many flies and parasites, incorporating organic material back into the soil, breaking up compacted soils and allowing better water penetration. Chris & Greg have worked hard to improve their soil, using sewerage ash and compost rather than commercial fertilizers. They practice rotational grazing and find that their Galloway cattle are ideal for browsing all sorts of rough pasture and weeds, as well as improved pastures. The result is that their cattle produce well marbled beef which Chris & Greg sell at the local Rotary run Capital Region Farmers market.

Greg also gave a talk on cattle handling for some of the newer members of the association. Galloways Australia often holds cattle handling field days at Minto and local residents are always welcome to attend.

Wallaroo Rural Fire Brigade report

The members of the Wallaroo Rural fire Brigade would like to wish our community a safe and prosperous 2012.

Summer has finally arrived and the grasses are very quickly drying out. The brigade has been busy already this season with calls to fires, car fires, motor vehicle accidents and property inspections.

The grass growth this year will present the potential for a very busy fire season locally. Care will need to be taken in doing all those maintenance tasks around dwellings and sheds, especially those involving machinery. If mowing, it is best done very early in the morning when the moisture level is generally higher. Do not undertake these activities on days of Total Fire Ban; with the right conditions a single spark can ignite grasses very easily, and spread quickly, destroying homes, crops and valuable items like sheds and machinery.

Since our community letter we have had 7 people indicate that they wish to join the brigade and are set to undertake the BF [basic fire-fighter] course starting in February. It is not too late if others wish to join and participate. The brigade meets most Wednesdays at the Wallaroo fire shed, 468 Wallaroo road from 6pm – 8pm.

The Rural Fire Service is made up of volunteers from all walks of life - men and women from different cultural backgrounds, age groups and professions. Rural fire brigades are a reflection of every local community. Becoming a volunteer fire-fighter is easier than most people think. Brigades offer training ranging from bush fire-fighting, village fire-fighting and first aid to breathing apparatus operation. We don't just offer fire-fighting roles, we have a multitude of areas that require volunteers. Communications, catering, logistics, planning and aviation support are critical – there is a job for nearly everyone in the RFS. We rely heavily on the support of people from all backgrounds in our community. The people that make up our Service are as different as the society that we protect. The minimum age to join the Rural Fire Service as a volunteer is 16 years.

There are steps you can take to be safer and are you "Prepared to Survive"?

Being prepared this bush fire season is an important part of protecting your family and home from the impacts of bush fires. A key to being prepared is to understand the level of bush fire risk you and your property are exposed to and the ways you can reduce this risk. The NSW Rural Fire Service has developed the following stepped process that ensures your Bush Fire Survival Plan is appropriate for your circumstances. To access these tools simply log on to the RFS web site and go to the "For the Community" section and follow the steps: These include **Step 1** – Household Assessment Tool, **Step 2** – Bush Fire Survival Tool, **Step 3** – Prepare Your Property Checklist and **Step 4** – Recovery after a Fire, or contact the brigade for these tools.



Happy Birthday Stan!

It's birthday time for another of Hall's senior citizens. You can't tell by the cut of his jib but Stan Sparrow has recorded 77 years on the highseas of life. Born in 1935, Stanley Raymond Sparrow (known by some as Capt. Jack of the Black Pearl); Stan is shown in the photograph with a replica of the Pearl presented by his family (crew).



Great year 1935, end of the great depression and beginning of the second world war. Stan lived in Sydney at Randwick went to school at Coogee, then Sydney High.

After the war, tradesmen were in short supply, so Stan took on a trade as a plumber. He played rugby league for Coogee and moved to Randwick Rugby Union 1957–59. He joined his young mate Ken Thornett and travelled to England. Ken stayed to play for Leeds, Stan came home in 1962 and gained a university entrance to Sydney University. He was recruited by the Federal public service spending 7 years in Trade/ Industry. Stan then went back to the building game, picked up another degree and became a teacher. Stan continues to teach at age 77 on a non-permanent contract, as he was over 60 when he signed on. He plans to go on with his teaching because of the enjoyment and the endless learning invloved.

Stan came to live in Hall in 1987. He wanted a country rural environment with easy access to hospitals, libraries, schools and the feeling of community.

4. CHAFFCUTTERS LANE

bounded by Victoria, Hoskins and Alexandra Streets



- A local tragedy was the accidental death of 24 year old Ernie Gribble when he slopped between the engine travelling wheel and the flywheel of the family chaff cutting plant. The lower part of his body was crushed. When he could be released he was carried to 'Cooee', the home of his sister nearby in Victoria Street, which adjoins this lane. Ernie, a fine, well respected young man, died soon after.
- As horses were used last century as a means of transport and to pull farming machinery, the chaff cutting plant was an important service, travelling to properties in the district to cut horse food.
- The village is named after the first landowner in the district, Henry Hall who obtained a grant of land in 1833. His property, 'Charnwood', was in the present suburb of Fraser. He was a magistrate of the Queanbeyan district. Henry and his wife Mary had four daughters and six sons. It was said "A more hospitable couple never lived", (Memories of Hall by Leon Smith, page 1).

This district has always been productive farming land, especially growing some of the finest merino wool in the country.

The village businesses still rely on the patronage of the landowners and hobby farmers in the surrounding district.

Chaffcutters Lane recognises the fine farming and grazing traditions since settlement and into the future.

Kinlyside Hall inVictoria Street

Built in 1907 by George Kendall Kinlyside, this building was constructed using a timber frame clad in corrugated iron, a construction technique characteristic of the era. The building was first used as a paint shop using a unique air-drying system designed by George Kinlyside.

It soon became the focal point of the developing Hall Village and was used for dances. It was then purchased by Jim Rochford and utilised as a cinema. Silent films




were shown here from as early as 1911, using hand operated projectors.

Happy New (FBT) Year!

Unlike a lot of other taxes, 31st March marks the end of the Fringe Benefits Tax (FBT) year. Most people probably think that FBT is just a tax on cars but it covers any non cash item or benefit given to an employee instead of wages. It was introduced in the mid '80s when the highest personal income tax rate was 60% (this started at a taxable income of \$35,000!) and the government believed that employees were evading tax by receiving non cash benefits instead of wages and enjoying such '80's lurks as the long business lunch.

There have been many changes to FBT over the years but one of the most recent was the introduction of a flat statutory rate of 20% for motor vehicles. The previous system

provided an incentive to

travel more kilometres in a year as this reduced the applicable FBT rate. Needless to say that this wasn't a very environmentally friendly policy. There are still two methods for valuing car fringe benefits and while the operating cost (log book) method has not changed, the change to a flat rate for the statutory method will be phased in over four years starting on 10th May 2011. This change only applies to cars purchased after that date but there will be winners and losers from this. If you travel less than 15,000kms per year your FBT rate reduces from 26% to 20% while if you travel more than 25,000 kms per year your rate increases from 11% to 20%.

Another common FBT query is what items can be provided to an employee without attracting FBT. The main FBT exempt items are certain work related items such as mobile phone, protective clothing, tools of the trade, briefcases, computer software, minor benefits costing less than \$300, relocation expenses, laptops and portable electronic devices. In today's IT dependent society, there is an increasing number of people with mobile phones, tablets such as the iPad and laptops. Even though all three devices have common characteristics they can all be used for different functions and so can be provided FBT free to an employee as long as they pass the "work test" and are used more than 50% of the time for work purposes.

Discovering different **Tomatoes**

During the years when our children attended Hall Primary School, there was a propagation nursery at the back of the school. Some years there was a wonderful array of little plants being grown from seed. In similar fashion, we have been discovering a number of heirloom type tomatoes during the past two summers.

Many varieties have a rich history and well as a rich flavour. They come from as far away as Russia, Italy, France and the Czech Republic. In a manner of speaking they represent the rich heritage of families who have lived in the Hall district over the years. Let me describe a few of the select varieties.

Cour di Bue is an Oxheart type Italian heirloom and a favourite among the country people of Italy. It is also known as the **'Bulls Heart'** and **'Giant Ox Heart'** tomato, with fruit weighing in at around 150-180 gm. It is a lovely slicing tomato due to it's dense meaty flesh, and few seeds. Also a good tomato for making sauce and it is unbeatable in salads or when served with slices of fresh Mozzarella and basil.

Rouge de Marmande is the classic beefsteak type French heirloom variety dating back to 1925. It is early



maturing and the bush will produce clusters of 170gm deep scarlet red, slightly flattened, ribbed tomatoes. It has been prized by cooks as it has outstanding flavour and very few seeds. As it can withstand colder conditions it will set more fruit in Canberra as the days become cooler. It has good disease and pest resistance.

> **Black Krim** is one of the Russian heirloom varieties producing large, 350gm, beefsteak type tomatoes. It has a dark red to maroon colour and the fruit has a rich flavour. The shoulders of the tomatoes have a dark green blush but the flesh is dark red. It is a heavy producer but the fruit is prone to cracking in wet weather.

Black Russian is one of the best black heirloom tomatoes. The fruit is round, medium in size, with a purple blush and the flesh is dark chocolate red in colour. It has a superb complex taste.

Jaunne Flammee is a favourite of mine. It is a French heirloom tomato which is round and medium in size with an orange to apricot colour. The fruit is sweet and juicy with a full bodied taste. Excellent for eating. This variety is early maturing and the bushes are prolific.

Olomovic is a delightful little round tomato which comes from the Czech Republic. It is early maturing and a



prolific producer of small - medium, red, globe shaped fruit to 40 mm. Its flesh is firm and so it is ideal for bottling, cooking, sauces, pastes and drying. It performs well in Canberra and this season gave us our first tomatoes – at Christmas time.

The **Yellow Roma** is a variant on the versatile paste tomato. It has a beautiful bright lemon yellow fruit which can be 9 - I I cm long. The plants produces good yields of sweet and smooth tasting fruit that are thick and meaty. The thick wall of the Roma makes it perfect for salsa and it can be used for making sauces, bottling and drying or just eaten fresh in salads.

The **Roma San Marzano** is the vigorous, cousin which produces clusters of larger meaty textured, pear shaped fruit. They will stores well and are crack resistant. This is the original Italian cooking tomato, due to its high solids. It is very tasty eaten fresh and ideal for bottling, cooking, the perfect variety for soups, sauce, paste, drying and puree.

St Pierre is a traditional French heirloom variety that produces medium-sized, red, round fruit with soft, thick, meaty flesh and a superb flavour. The bushes can grow abundant crops even in poor soil conditions. It is a favourite of mine and yields well in cooler growing regions.

Camp Joy is one of the larger red cherry tomatoes, producing fruit to 25–35mm. This tomato has a delicious, sweet flavour and is considered to be one of the best. It is a heavy cropper and has good disease resistance.

Gardener's Delight yields very large clusters of sweet, egg shaped, large cherry tomatoes which have excellent flavour. It produces over an extended period. The fruit are most delicious when left to sun-ripen on the bush. They have a good acidic, complex tomato taste. It is considered one of the best tasting cherry types of tomato, having the true tangy flavor of tomatoes of a century or more ago.

Thai Pink Egg tomatoes produce a jade pink egg shaped fruit to 40mm. It has a sweet flavour, and the flesh is firm. The bushes are very prolific and the fruit resists cracking even in heavy rain periods.

We are hoping to have a good selection of these tomatoes when we hold our annual Apple Day Festival at our Loriendale Orchard, along Spring Range Road on 31 March. With good water supplies in our dams and the days of summer with us, we are hoping to have a very good supply of both the heritage and modern apples, pears and tomatoes available. The event commences at 1.30pm and it is a fund raising day supporting several community development and medical charities including in Nepal, East Timor in Northern Australia.



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
