## Hall Men's Shed 2022 – 2023 Foreman's Annual Report

We had a BBQ to start the year on 7<sup>th</sup> July 2022 with 28 attendees. The year has started well with a few of us finishing off the footbridge across the creek at the Showgrounds. Several of us attended the funeral of Danny Clynk's wife, Linda in July. It was a sad but beautiful event as Linda was well loved in the Hall community.

In early August there was lots of rain and the new footbridge was flooded but it survived which is a testimony to the work we did. In later August we had a special event where we had a party for the Pre-School kids. We cooked for them and they performed a dance for us. It was a terrific meeting. It is so much of a pity that the Pre-School has since closed down as it was a great source of contact between some of us oldies and the lovely youngsters. We will miss them a lot.

Our BBQ in October was a special event as we invited the Yass Valley Men's Shed to attend a Pizza Day with us. 45 people attended including 10 from Yass.
